Sustainability and Environmental Governance (SEG)



It was entirely appropriate that the SEG discussion evening took place on World Clean-up Day, in Climate Action Week. That was Friday 20th of September, this year, when we were addressed by special guest, Jenny Brown, the Climate Lead for the Brisbane Conservation Council.

Jenny is a dynamic and knowledgeable young woman, who discussed numerous topics, such as climate change targets, coal and gas mining, recovery of minerals, solar power, transport, manufacturing, sustainable farming and economic issues. Twelve people attended and had plenty of questions for her. We learnt that some small countries were doing much better than large countries at addressing these issues. In Australia, Queensland was the worst polluter - not something to be proud of, is it?

It was suggested that better transport networks and the encouragement of more local manufacturing options would reduce pollution, save costs, and provide Australia with greater independence than at present. Currently, Australia sends extracted raw materials overseas for processing and then imports back the resulting products. Doing this ourselves would save travel miles and bring other benefits such as employment opportunities.

It was acknowledged that changing the political will would be a critical factor and that many government decisions were economically based, rather than on the environmental impact or benefit.

Despite this, and the fact that there is still so much more to be done, at all levels of society, the conclusions were positive. Looking back over the past decades proved what had already been achieved, the knowledge gained and should provide a good outlook for the future.

Children's Ministry

Starting Early

This article was inspired by the photo on the right of my great granddaughter carrying the host to the altar at Holy Trinity Anglican church Fortitude Valley with help from Father Rodney Wolf.

Millie and her family have been attending the 7am service since she was a baby. She is familiar with the service. She often joins the priest in the sanctuary; sits and listens and one wonders what she is thinking. On special feast days when the choir and organ are in full voice. Millie who has music in her soul will dance in the sanctuary, much to the delight of the congregation.

But Millie is not alone. Her ministry has begun early like that of many children today who are welcomed to the

service and invited to take part. At St Luke's the children are invited to join in with the worshipping, given a short often creative lesson based on the reading of the day and then taken out of the nave for Children's Church. They return later for communion and blessings and to show and tell the congregation what they have learned. As they grow they will no doubt carry their love of the Holy Spirit with them into the wider world.

This beginning is very different from my own early experience as a child where attending church was rather frightening, as the priest, dressed in black robes, preached about sin and fear. As far as I could see there was no joy. But I was encouraged to continue by my godmother and gradually over the years my own ministry has led me down many different paths. It is in these children that I see hope for the future of all races and religions.

I was christened in 1939 in the Church of England, Darwin. My father was working at the aerodrome as a meteorologist. This church was bombed in 1942. Mum and I were evacuated, flew to Brisbane and Dad followed in an RAAF plane.

Years later I returned to visit and found a beautiful Cathedral had been erected. A small chapel was dedicated to the original church. The Dean, Father Jeremy Greaves, offered to show me the font which he kept in a cupboard in the vestry. He returned with a small metal container about a foot high. Such a small link with the past. I sometimes wonder if Archbishop Jeremy remembers our short and meaningful encounter.



When I joined St Luke's Theatre fifty seven years ago Jan Moody was president, and remained so for many years, doing an outstanding job, presenting plays that the audiences thoroughly enjoyed.

She had a very good knowledge of all facets of theatre and passed this on to other theatre personnel. All the plays brought in large numbers and the money was put to good use. There was always money available for the parish when needed, St John's Cathedral (as they were finishing the front of the church), caring for a child needing help, charities and always the Christmas Bowl appeal.

Jan was an excellent director herself, directed many plays and used suitable directors, when needed. The sets, clothing, accessories and music were always first class and of the correct vintage.

A small group of people from other amateur theatres and Jan formed a committee {just before I came} to help each other.

Jan was a very good church member and was given permission to present a religious play in the church. For all of the valuable work and time given Jan was presented with an OAM by the governor.

On Sunday 20th October 2024, the church was decorated by Alison and Jen, the choir sang, and a delicious 100th birthday cake, prepared by Alison, was enjoyed by all after the 7 am and 9 am services, celebrating 100 years of worship in this place.

Happy Birthday Ekibin!

This is an edited part of a sermon I preached on St Luke's Day, 20th October 2024, reflecting on the early history of the parish.

St Luke's Day marks the 100th anniversary of the appointment of the first minister here in Ekibin. It is therefore a time when it is worth looking back and giving thanks for those who have gone before us. We will have many opportunities to do this over the year ahead, so today I want to think especially about the very start of the parish.

Back in the 1920s, Ekibin was a very different place to what we have today. We might think we are relatively close to the city centre — what is it, just 15 minutes on a 120 bus. But then 4.5 miles (just over 7km) was a long way. The nearest churches were St Phillips in the Thompson Estate (now Annerley), and Holy Trinity, Woolloongabba, quite some distance to walk. And a much larger proportion of the population had a religious affiliation. In 1921: 45% Anglican, 20% Catholic, 30% other Christian denominations. So, there was seen to be a need for a new church in our area. I'll read the story that the first minister gave in Edition 1 of Church News in March 1925:

From the time that the Archbishop of Brisbane made his ringing appeal in synod [in 1924] for a forward movement of the Church in Ekibin events moved quickly. The Council of the Diocese bought a splendidly central area of land, over an acre in extent in Ekibin Road East, out of its own funds for the time being. The present Minister in Charge was offered the task of pioneering the Church, and came into residence on October 16th last. There being no Church or Sunday School, or any convenient hall of any kind, services were held and a Sunday School organised in the house of the Minister in Charge. The Diocesan Council was appealed to for a loan to erect a Church Hall, and again the Council came to the aid of Ekibin, and advanced us a sum of over £600. The fine hall, bearing the name of St Luke's Church Hall, was erected, and duly opened by the Archbishop on January 16th last.

There are some exciting things about this account to me.

The diocese as a whole was looking forward in mission and the diocesan council, on behalf of the diocese, were forward thinking in making a sound investment. Things certainly moved very fast, but I guess that building regulations weren't as tight back then as they are now, and a wooden church hall is much quicker to build than what we are doing now. There was also a calling for leadership of the new church. The first minister, Rev'd Leslie Dawson


Thomas, who had trained at Moore College in Sydney, and worked in New Zealand, was appointed as curate of St Phillips, Thompson Estate, with responsibility for the church in Ekibin, so our parish was a result of a missional activity of that parish as well.

Rev'd Thomas was appointed on St Luke's Day in October 1924, even before the church was completed the following January, and immediately began to grow the parish. Key on his mind was raising money to pay off the debt for the church. He encouraged everyone who came to worship to contribute a shilling a week (this is the equivalent of \$5 a week), thereby raising the money in two years, at which time the church could be consecrated, and Rev'd Thomas was appointed Vicar.

He also grew the Sunday School, and by March 1925 there were 70 on the roll. Once a month, to give the Sunday School teachers a break, they had a children's service instead.

I mention these things because our priorities today have not changed, even though the world is a different place, and the days of a large proportion of the population coming to church and 70+ in a Sunday School are in the past. We are still called to look to the future, to nurture our children, and to invest our time and money in building for mission (both people and bricks and mortar).

It is apposite therefore that, in our centenary year, we are building for a

new phase of God's ministry here. The diocese has once again come to our aid in funding our development and we are working in partnership with others in the diocese, most notably the Schools Commission. Just as the first St Lukes church hall was a place where the community could be welcomed, our new and refreshed facilities will be able to continue this tradition.

Revd. Timothy will also submit a notice for Focus to announce this event. We are hoping current and past parishioners will attend-mainly by word-of-mouth invitation. Lunch is planned to be finger food with non-alcoholic punch and sparkling wine.

Our next 100th celebration event will be a combined 9 am service on Sunday 19th January and this will mark the dedication of St. Luke's church by Archbishop Sharp on 16.1.1925 and the first church service held on 25.1.1925. We will share morning tea after our service.



All Souls Service



To commemorate All Souls Day an evening prayer service was held at St Luke's on Sunday the third of November at 5pm. Thirteen people attended this beautiful and touching service.

All Souls Day remembers our loved ones who have died, to commend them to God's mercy and to pray for ourselves. The service began with the hymn, 'The Day Thou Gavest'.

The Reverend Timothy spoke of the Celtic tradition of Halloween when the spirits of the dead roamed through the night and people living could make contact with them. Today our connection to our loved ones is through God.

During the prayers the names parishioners remembered were read out, as we came forward to light candles. The names of parishioners who had died this year were also read out. The service ended with the hymn, 'Lord for the Years'.

After the service, Brian played, 'Abide With Me' on the electronic piano with orchestral backing. People left in silence.

September 2024 to November 2024

September was designated by our parish to be a month for the celebration of creation. The choir thus selected the song, 'For the Beauty of the Earth' as its contribution at the usual 9am and 7am services. The lyrics were written by English poet and hymn writer F.S.Pierpoint in the 19th century. The choir sang a version set to music by renowned 20th century composer John Rutter in 1978. We sang it generally in 3-parts with some additional 'bass' contributions by David and found some of it a bit 'tricky' as regards the meter but were pleased overall with its presentation.

For October and November, the choir departed from its routine of singing '2nd Sunday at 9am; 4th Sunday at 7am'. In October this was largely to do with school holidays, long weekends and tying in with our

patronal saint's day. Consequently the choir sang once only in October on the 20th as a contribution to our St Luke's Day service. The song presented is called 'Revival', words and music by Robin Mark. This song was written about 25 years ago and



has been described as 'a driving rock anthem which captures the prayer of the church' i.e. revival. While it is in some hymn books, Trevor introduced it to the choir. It was presented mainly in unison, with some soprano descant interpretation. Then, so the 7 o'clockers didn't miss out on it, it was presented again as the reflection item in the service on 3rd November.

The following Sunday – 10th November – was designated as Defence Services Sunday by the Anglican Church in Australia. Brian introduced a new song, 'After the War', by Paul Gross and David Keele, to an arrangement by Mark Sirett. It was written for the 2008 Canadian film, 'Passchendaele' which told a story about a soldier in World War 1. Mark Sirett arranged it for 4-part singing with piano accompaniment. The choir presented it as a 'reflection' item during the 7am service. It is a fairly complex piece, but we were satisfied with its presentation.

This brought us to the final Sunday of this period, 24th November. This is the last Sunday of the church's liturgical year and celebrates 'Christ the

King'. The choir's selection for the 9am service on this day was the Henry W Baker hymn, 'The King of Love'. The version selected was a 3-part arrangement by Julie K n o w l e s t o a traditional Irish tune.

On the afternoon of 24th November, the annual ecumenical concert in our district



in honour of St Cecilia, the patron saint of music, was held at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church at Woolloongabba. The choir has participated in this concert for many years and this year performed the three most recent songs in its repertoire – 'The King of Love', 'After the War', and 'Revival'. The concert was again very successful and our contributions were well received.

We move on now to Christmas, which is always a good time for singing.

Redevelopment Update

Work on our redevelopment continues on track, despite the wild weather we have had recently. Most of the framing of the new build is complete and work is progressing within the old house and hall.

This last month also saw work taking place within the church building itself. Doors have replaced the three windows on the north side of the church. These have been expertly designed to match the style of the windows they replace. The flower room will be remodelled as a kitchenette with servery hatch to the deck. We have new energy efficient lights throughout, a new ducted air conditioning system and new fans. The walls and ceiling inside the church are being repainted and the exposed areas of wooden floor sanded and resealed.

Rev'd Timothy, together with Matthew Patterson, the architect and Cenk Yuksel from the diocesan property team recently took a site visit to view the works.


